#### David L Markiewitz, DDS

Long-time resident of Tehachapi, Dave Markiewitz, who was born in Mojave, excelled in sports, and became a dentist, had another interest besides fixing peoples' teeth and brightening their smiles. When not in the dental office, Dr. Markiewitz was an avid amateur geologist, lecturer, and underground lode miner holding and working claims in the Mojave Desert and Kelso Valley for nearly 40 years. He used his mining skills and experience to write the highly successful book, *A Fortune in the Desert* in 1985.

At the Sept. 12th meeting, we will be showing a video filmed by Dave's wife about hardrock mining in the Mojave Mining District. Seen in the film will be Markiewitz, his dad Louis Markiewitz and Terry Burton. We think you'll find this very interesting!

In Markiewitz's book, A Fortune in the Desert, he provided information on mining techniques so that


any one interested can learn how

to "reap the riches still held within the earth". And Dave gave credit to the one partner he had in mining, his father who was involved in mining for forty-five years in the early to mid 1950's and who passed on his skills to his son. Markiewitz's hope was that the information presented in his book would give people, "whether novices, hobbyists or soon to be seasoned miners, the necessary know-how to become members of a very elite group - the precious metals miners." His book, published in 1985, may be available online at various websites.

The following article on mining in the Mojave area was printed in 1996 and is one of the books available from the Kern Antelope Historical Society.

**MOJAVE - A Rich History of RAILS, MINES and FLIGHT**, compiled by Glen A. Settle & Cathy Hansen, published in 1996 to help commemorate Mojave's 120<sup>th</sup> birthday (1876-1996).

<u>Preface</u> for "Mining History of Mojave Area" by Glen A. Settle: Glen Settle's Mojave mining history is from his knowledge of mining in the Mojave area. He was born in Palmdale, California in 1911. Glen has contributed many stories for past Kern-Antelope Historical Society publications and other mining journals. He was fortunate to know most of the early day miners mentioned in this history.

#### Pages 30-31:

#### **Mojave Mining History**

Early residents of Mojave tell of the local Indians selling trinkets to the passengers while their trains made the water and food stop in Mojave. One of these passengers was a miner by the name of W. W. Bowers. His interest was aroused when he noticed the Native Americans selling Quartz crystals. To a miner this is like waving a "red flag in front of a bull."

After buying some of these crystals and inquiring where they were found, Bowers vowed to return to Mojave, which he did, in 1894.

On March 8, 1894 Bowers made his first gold and silver strike on what was known then as "the Little Buttes," a few miles south of Mojave. It is now known as Standard Hill. Little did Bowers know that 40 years later, one of the largest gold and silver strikes in California would be made on a neighboring hill to the south known as "Soledad Mountain," and it would attract the attention of the entire mining world! Bowers and others mined this area for the next several years.

Soledad Mountain drew many miners that had success finding the precious metals. Such mines as the Elephant Eagle, Karma, Yellow Dog, Standard, Whitmore, Queen Esther, Bobtail, Echo and Gray Eagle, to name a few.

These mines attracted the attention of Jess Knight at the Elephant Eagle, (whose son Goodwin was later to become Governor of the Golden State of California) and H. Clifford Burton of the Yellow Dog, who later with his brother Cecil, became sole owners of the "historic" Tropico Mine near Rosamond.

Clifford's mining knowledge became known throughout the desert mining camps. He had grub staked many gold seeking miners and the two brothers opened their mill at Tropico to all miners needing a place to recover their precious metals.

Soon the Burton Brothers' reputation for quick payment, honest dealings and good mill recovery reached over 400 miners who shipped their valuable ore to the mill.


I can personally thank H. Clifford Burton for helping me learn what knowledge of mining I have. I never tired of hearing his stories about mining here, in Mexico and of his other interesting ventures.



The Wegman's, whose father was Percy, had much success in early mining and in later years, his son Bert. Some of the others who were successful were Bert Fischer, J. Withers, Whitmore, P. O. Paulson and Earl Blickenstaff.

From the scrapbooks of the late Clifford Burton and news articles from the *Mojave Record*, the *Los Angeles Times* and the *Examiner*, we can learn much of the interesting tales of the Yellow Dog Mining Company which was located a few miles south of Mojave.


